......just stop eating!" (John Lennon)

Itos a fair bet that the late John Lennon didnot own a Labrador Retriever! The Labrador is an example of a breed that lives for food, or anything that remotely resembles food.

We have a particular empathy for those Labrador owners (and owners of other foodobsessed large breed dogs) who struggle with this issueí ...and its implications. A client informed us recently that she came home from work to find her obese Labrador with its empty10kg bag of Pal Meaty Bites stuck on its head, its belly markedly distended, groaning in pain. The bag had been two-thirds full before she left for work that morning!

In fact a significant percentage of our large-breed dogs are obesity-prone, foodobsessed, and quite content to lie around all day doing nothing. Some have preexisting joint disease and are unable to engage in a long, brisk walk. Combine these characteristics with the average pet-owners inability to resist õthose big brown eyesö, and our inability to tailor our dogøs energy intake with its energy expenditure, and we clearly have a problem on our hands.

What problem?

ALL large-breed dogs in their õseniorö years will end-up with some degree of arthritic disease. Some will be coping with joint pain at a much earlier age, courtesy of conditions such as hip and elbow dysplasia, and cruciate ligament disease of the knee.

While genetics and poor design are partly responsible for these debilitating disorders, controlling your dogs body weight will be the single biggest factor that influences the onset of these disorders, and the pain that your dog is tolerating. This week alone I have euthanised two otherwise healthy older dogs for intractable joint pain. Both were significantly overweight.

Solutions

- 1) The Weekly õWashboardö Test: Those of you with growing puppies should run you fingers over your dogs rib cage **ONCE A WEEK**, for the rest of the dogs life. The rib cage should feel like the old washboard that our grandparents used for washing their clothes. Why weekly? Youdl be able to pick-up excesses in body condition **AT AN EARLY STAGE**, and make downward adjustments in feeding levels (call us if you need advice).
- 2) Feeding Guidelines: Remember that the feeding guidelines on your petsø food ARE JUST THAT: GUIDELINES - They assume that your dog is a cattlechasing kelpie. In some cases it is appropriate to feed up to 40% less than the recommendation.
- 3) õBUT MY DOG WILL BE DESPARATELY HUNGRYÖ, I hear you saying! If your dog has an ideal body condition, and is begging for more food, then give him a pat, a belly rubí í whatever, but donøt offer him some of you Camembert Cheeseí í í Seem like common sense? If you must offer your dog a treat, then it must form part of his daily food allowance.
