

## ance and Medications

Recently published research found that only 48% of people took their own medications as prescribed. In veterinary medicine some estimates have been as low as 20% of animals receiving medicines as directed. This is understandable as frequently animals are none too cooperative!

With antibiotic medicines, not giving them as directed could help lead to antibiotic resistance. A new drug released in Australia promises to make compliance a whole lot easier. This new antibiotic for dogs and cats, a potent one particularly for those with skin or urinary tract infections, is given by simple and painless injection and lasts for weeks, removing the need for any follow up tablets.

Another medication that has made life easier for cats and their owners is <u>Revolution</u>. Control of parasites is always regarded as the number one health priority in cats, both from the cats point of view and the owners.

The misery and chronic ill health caused by fleas, lice and mites is obvious. The chronic disease caused by microscopic organisms they carry is less obvious.
